3.2 First aid

Policy statement

We are able to take action to apply first aid treatment in the event of an accident involving a child or adult. At least two adults with a current first aid certificate is on the premises, or on an outing, at any one time. Newly qualified staff who achieved an early year's qualification at level 2 or 3 on or after 30 June 2016 also have a paediatric first aid certificate in order to be counted in the adult/child ratios. The first aid qualification includes first aid training for infants and young children. We have evidence of due diligence when choosing first aid training and ensure that it is relevant to adults caring for young children.

We also provide staff with specialist training for various medical conditions, as and when required, for example, diabetes, anaphylaxis.

Procedures

The first aid kit

Our first aid kit is accessible at all times and contains the following items:

- Triangular bandages (all sterile)
- Sterile dressings:
 - Small
 - Medium
 - Large
 - Extra Large
- Low adherent pad dressings (plasters).
- Sterile eye pads (with bandage or attachment) e.g. No 16 dressing
- x1 tubular bandage
- x5 saline wipes
- x1 pair of scissors
- 5cm gauze swabs
- Resuscitation face shield
- Safety pins x6

- Instant ice pack
- Hand wash wipes
- Guidance card as recommended by HSE x 1
- In some cases an emergency blanket

There will be a slight variation for the baby room first aid kits.

In addition, the following equipment is kept near or in the first aid box:

- 3 pairs of disposable plastic (PVC or vinyl) gloves.
- 1 plastic disposable apron.
- A children's forehead 'strip' thermometer.
- A supply of ice is kept in the freezer.
- A list of staff and volunteers who have current PFA certificates is displayed in the setting & made available to parents.
- The first aid box is easily accessible to adults and is kept out of the reach of children.
- There is a named person (Maria Drozd) in the setting who is responsible for checking and replenishing the first aid box contents.
- Medication is only administered in line with our Administering Medicines policy.
- In the case of minor injury or accidents, first aid treatment is given by a qualified first aider.
- In the event of minor injuries or accidents, we normally inform parents when they collect their child, unless the child is unduly upset or we have concerns about the injury. In which case we will contact the child's parents for clarification of what they would like to do, i.e. whether they wish to collect the child and/or take them to their own GP.
- An ambulance is called for children requiring emergency treatment. We contact parents immediately and inform them of what has happened and where their child has been taken.
- Parents sign a consent form at registration allowing a member of staff to take their child to the nearest Accident and Emergency unit to be examined, treated or admitted as necessary on the understanding that they have been informed and are on their way to the hospital.
- Accidents and injuries are recorded on our accident sheets, where applicable, notified to the Health and Safety Executive, Ofsted and/or local child protection agencies in line with our Recording and Reporting of Accident and Incidents Policy.
